## ***B. Protecting and Supporting Biodiversity***

Recreation Grounds

- No Mow May 2025. For the first time areas on Parfitt Drive, Wilsons Field, The Acres and Reynolds fields were marked out and signs erected to denote these areas would not be mown. Mown paths were created to allow residents to access pitches and recreational areas freely.

Open Space and Woodland

- The Squirrels uniform Group planted an oak tree in Compartment 1 in Feb. They are enjoying the woodland
- Western Power have cut down the Cherry saplings under the power lines on the Eastern footpath in the woodland
- Need to advertise the safe disposal of cigarette butts. Too many found near the Football pavilion. Suggest sticker on the door

- Parish Council Litter grabbers continue to be used in the community. 18 are out on semi permanent loan and Mansfield Road, Cockett Lane and the village are regularly picked. Thanks go to all the volunteers
- The WI have replanted the tubs on the Ridgeway Green Space and members of FCS continue to look after this area. Typical activities include cutting back the Buddleia , borders and mowing them 2x a year as a meadow. Yellow Rattle are increasing and having an effect on the more vigorous grasses. A water butt has been reinstated and helps us to water the planter again with the help of volunteers. Big thanks to our new neighbours next to the Green Space
